The cabinet provides practical activities for the following disciplines: search and rescue at sea, seamanship, individual survival techniques with the following objectives:

General Objective:

Building and developing the aptitude (knowledge, skills, higher organizing abilities) for and and managing search rescue activities in the most complex situations functioning as an officer with an operational rank on ships efficiently responding and in distress situations at sea.



Specific Objectives:

- ✓ To use protective and safety measures for passengers in emergency situations (competency 1.5, A -II /1, STCW Code).
- ✓ Assessment of the procedures to be followed for rescuing persons in the water, assisting a ship in distress, the



response to port emergencies. (*competency 1.5, A -II /1, STCW Code*)

- ✓ To know the content of the IMO IAMSAR Manual (*competency 1.6, A -II /1, STCW Code*)
- ✓ To have the capacity of organizing abandon ship drills (*competency 3.4, A -II /1, STCW Code*)
- ✓ To know how to operate survival means and life boats, other appliances like Radio, EPIRB, SART, immersion suit and thermal protective aid (competency 3.4, A -II /1, STCW Code)
- ✓ To know the survival at sea techniques. (*competency* 3.4, A -II /1, STCW Code)
- ✓ To know how to organize, coordinate and lead search and rescue operations at sea functioning as an officer with a managerial rank on ships (*competency* 1.5, A -II /2, STCW Code).
